

Values:

- Person-centric approaches with all interventions and outcomes
- Engagement with the entire family for planning, services and outcomes
- Community engagement and collaboration with the entire family
- Strengthening relationships among youth, family, schools and community

Focus:

- Each individual and family and their unique needs and expectations

Intervention model:

- Person-centered planning
- Person-driven and person-centric services and supports

Interventions and Supports with CaPROMISE

Interventions:

- Case Management and Transition Services
- Financial Planning and Benefits Management Services
- Career and Work-Based Learning Services
- Parent and Guardian Training and Information Services
- Other Support Services (i.e. independent living, self-determination, technology)

Supports:

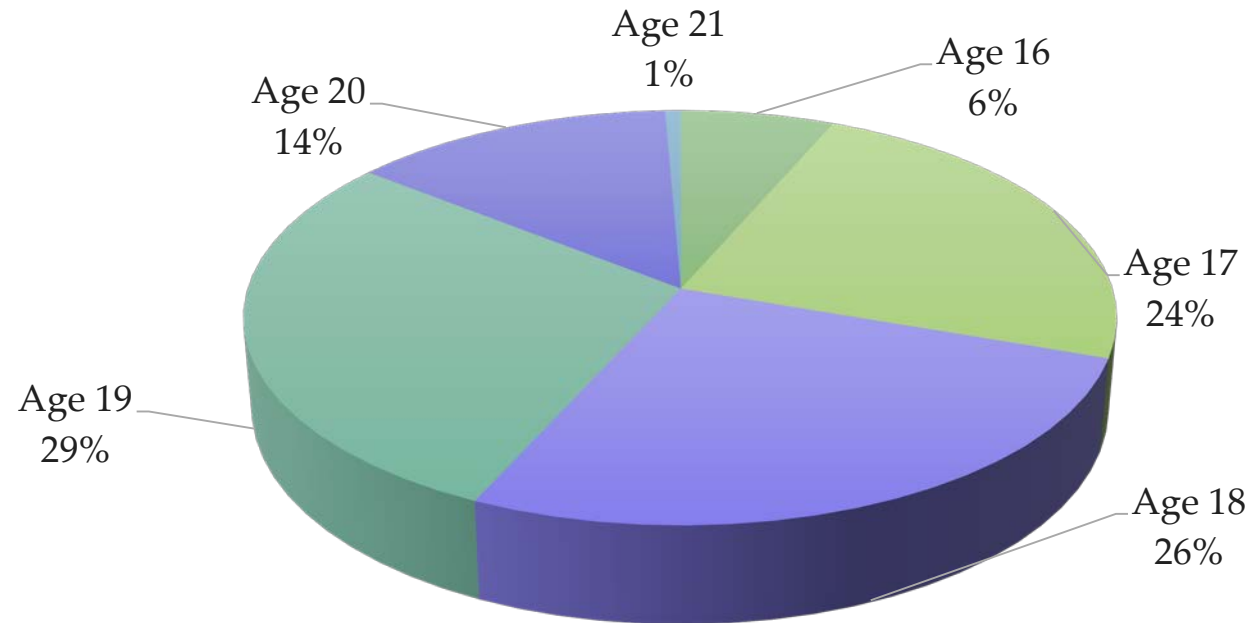
- Family Resource Centers and Independent Living Centers
- Undergraduate and Graduate interns in Rehabilitation and Social Work

Age of CaPROMISE Youth on 9-30-18

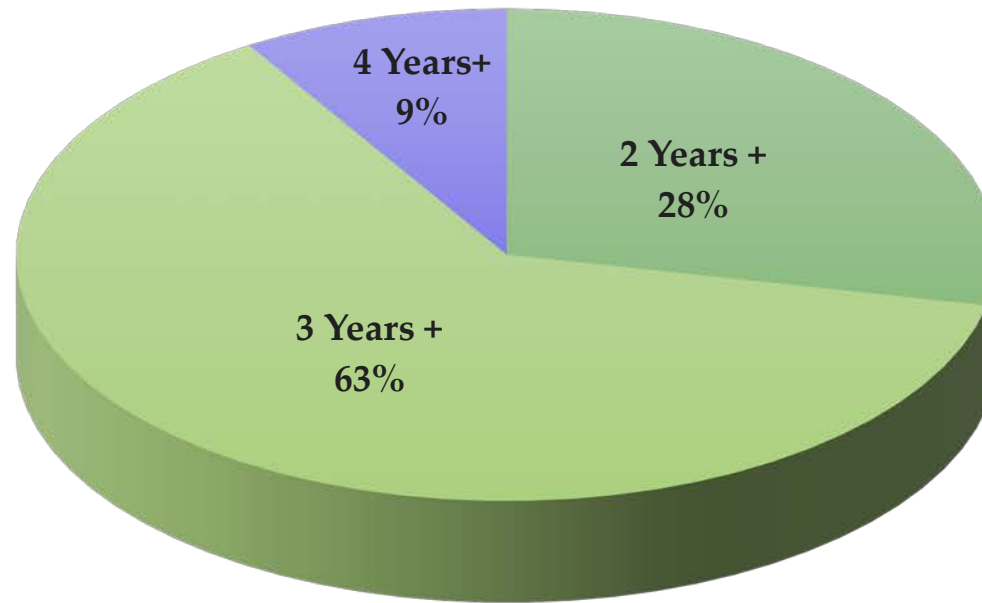
Age at end of funding

Sustainability of CaPROMISE

The opportunity and the challenge is to continue providing support and interventions for the CaPROMISE youth –

- CDOR is working to make each youth VR eligible and developing an Individual Plan of Employment
- The individualized support for family members are typically not covered by existing funding organizations that serve the youth – **these supports are essential**

Emerging Public Policy Issues

The emerging public policy issues impacting the CaPROMISE youth and their families are creating opportunities and challenges, including:

- Working with the youth and family members through multiple provider systems is unusual and complicated
- SSA implementation of regulations vary from office to office (lack of consistency)
- Funded programs in schools, state agencies and community organizations have evolved over time and are driven by legislative mandates (system-centric design)
- WIOA is changing the expectations and requirements for transition-aged youth
- Data sharing and case management systems impact collaboration
